


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


## an ECONOMIC JUSTICE FILM FESTIVAL

**October 16: *Why Poverty?*** – Before we can talk about eradicating poverty, we first have to understand the causes. This provocative animated film takes us on a journey through time and space, examining poverty across history & cultures. Discussion to follow screening.

**McFarland UCC, 5710 Anthony Street, McFarland, 6:30-8:30 pm**

**October 23: *Food Stamped*** – Follow Yoav and Shira Potash as they attempt to eat healthy while sticking to a food stamp budget. While on the Challenge, Yoav and Shira talk with politicians, food pantry staff, and food stamp recipients to learn more about the problem of hunger in America. After the film there will be a discussion led by staff from 2nd Harvest Food Bank.

**November 6: *Paycheck to Paycheck*** – Maria Shriver's new documentary follows single mom Katrina Gilbert as she struggles to support herself & 3 kids on \$9.49/hr. After paying rent, daycare, phone, gas and other bills, she has nothing left. Food stamps run out & she can't afford needed medications. After the film, UW School of Social Work Professor Eric Lock will speak about the plight of the working poor.

**Lake Edge UCC, 4200 Buckeye Rd., Madison, 6:30-8:30 pm**

**Nov. 20: *Park Avenue*** – Explores income inequality through the stark contrast between the top of Park Avenue in Manhattan, where 1 luxurious apartment building houses a greater concentration of billionaires than anywhere else; vs. 10 minutes away in the Bronx, where half the residents of that end of Park Av. are on food stamps, unemployment is at 19% & their children are 20x more likely to be killed than their neighbors to the south. Discussion to follow.

**Memorial UCC, 5705 Lacy Rd., Fitchburg, 6:30-8:30 pm**

**December 10: *The Line*** – Tells the stories of 3 people in different parts of the country, each of whom lives at or below the poverty line. They are people like you & me, but various circumstances have conspired to bring them to or keep them in poverty. UW Professor Anna Haley Lock, nationally recognized expert in low-wage and low-skilled workers & income inequality, will speak after the film.
